




In the country of Rabelais

Seuilly

2h30 - 8km - easy

This walk from from Seuilly to Cinais is bursting with variety with valleys, woodlands, heaths, views and its famous native François Rabelais. Follow in the footsteps of the famous author.

Seuilly Abbey

1

The walk starts at **Seuilly Abbey** in the village centre. It was founded by the Benedictines in 1100 and François Rabelais studied here. It is now home to the CPIE (Permanent Environmental Project Centre) which runs themed guided tours. A regional centre has local produce, exhibitions and crafts. Follow the yellow markers.

Educational trail

Hit the white stone path to La Devinière Abbey. **The In Rabelais' Footsteps educational botany trail** runs along the route for approximately 600 m. Information boards and puzzles show you that nature isn't just for specialists. Reach the museum car park.

3 Musée Rabelais

A trip to the **museum in La Devinière** is highly recommended. The 15th century house is where Rabelais was born in 1494. It set the scene for the Picrocholine Wars depicted by the author in his book *Gargantua*. It is now home to a literary museum devoted to him with countless events and temporary exhibitions. Turn left after the car park and up the road towards the hill.

Panorama

Stop at Cinais Cemetery for endless views of the Seuilly plateau. To the south you can see the **Château de Coudray-Montpensier** which was built in the 14th and 15th century. To the east you can also see the recently restored Forteresse Royale de Chinon.

Go back down to Cinais village. Fork left towards a clearing then right.

Cinais

Go past the 19th century **Saint-Hilaire Church** which is built on the site of an older building that was pillaged by protestants in 1562. Then take your time going up Chemin de la Garenne lined with houses dug into the tuffeau stone known as «residential caves» or «troglodyte homes». Turn left.

Roman Camp

Take a left at the fork. Welcome to the **Roman Camp** which was actually a site from the Iron Age (1 BC) making up a unique group of megaliths in Chinon until it was demolished. Go right through the heather. There are 25 different species here. Signs tell you about the flora, fauna and the many mysteries surrounding the site.

Chemin de Saint Martin

Stay on the plateau, the peak of the town at an altitude of 110 m. Go through woodlands made up mainly of oaks, chestnuts trees and crop plots. The white markers you can see on the way show that you're on **Chemin de Saint Martin**, the saint who died in nearby Candes-Saint-Martin. Aside from the cardinal points, the initials D and M stand for Doyenné de Saint-Martin (group of several parishes). Turn left.

Bois de Bourg

Leave Bois de Bourg and walk between crop fields and the edge of the woods. Turn left then right. On the Seuilly hills ahead you can see the fabulous Château de Coudray-Montpensier which, after surviving the Picrocholine Wars, underwent restoration work of «gargantuan» proportions to use Rabelais' words.

Seuilly

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You're nearing the end of your outing. Spot some vines. They make AOC (Controlled Designation of Origin) Chinon wine. Return to the abbey's walls where, according to Rabelais, **Frère Jean des Entommeures so valiantly defended the perimeter by killing 13622 men who had come to pillage the vineyards.**
